This report provides key demographic and economic data for Illinois Congressional District 13. It is made available by the DuPage Workforce Board, Workforce Board of Northern Cook County, and Workforce Investment Board of Will County.¹

At A Glance

- The Congressional District’s current **population** of 938,582 is expected to increase by 78,166 (8%) over the next ten years.
- Ten **employers** in this Congressional District have 2,000 or more employees. These large employers represent six different industry sectors.
- By 2016, this Congressional District is projected to create 45,289 **new jobs** with positions in business and financial operations and healthcare practitioners and technicians representing the largest numbers of new jobs.
- The Congressional District’s **largest industry sector** of employment is retail trade followed by healthcare and social assistance.
- **Educational attainment** in the 13th Congressional District overall is higher than the State’s. 72.5% of residents have some college or higher and 45.6% have a bachelor’s degree or higher, as compared to the State’s rates of 59.2% and 30.8% respectively.

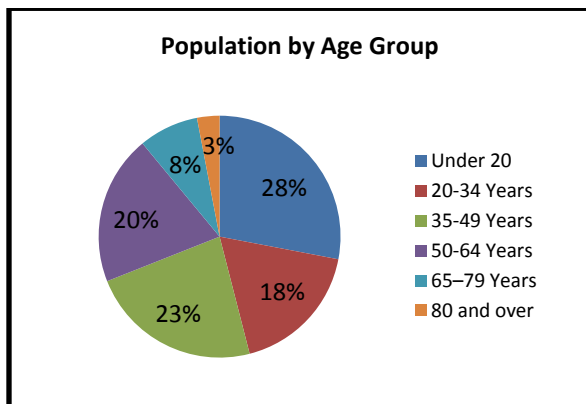
Population

- The Congressional District’s current population of 938,582 is expected to grow at a much higher rate than the State’s population.

- The proportion of the Congressional District’s population that is 20-34 years of age is 3% lower than the State’s population while its 35-49 years of age is 3% higher than the State’s population.

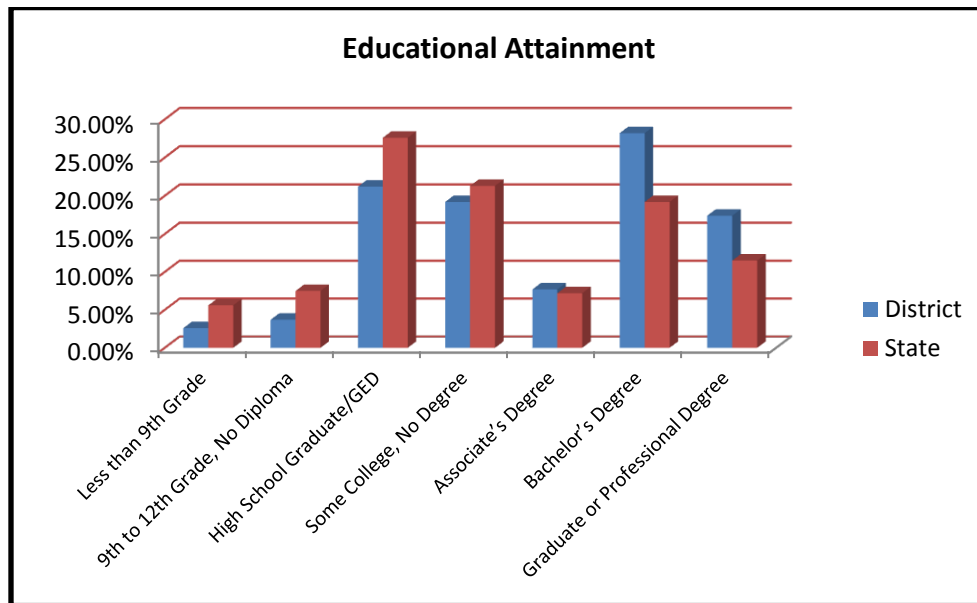
¹ With the exception of educational attainment data, all data in this report has been compiled at the zip code level. Consequently, regardless of whether a portion or entire zip code area is included in the congressional district, data for the entire zip code area is reflected in report data. .

Educational Attainment

- A significantly higher percentage of the Congressional District’s population ages 25 and over have attained a bachelor’s degree or higher (45.6%) than the State attainment rate (30.8%).
- The percent of individuals who have completed some postsecondary education is 72.5% as compared to the State’s rate of 59.2%.

Industry Sector Employment

Between 2006 and 2011

- The Congressional District gained 4,709 jobs in the past 5 years while the State lost 103,587 jobs overall.
- The industry sectors gaining the most jobs over the past 5 years were healthcare and social assistance (10,453) and management of companies (3,628).
- Industry sectors with the largest job loss between 2006 and 2011 were construction (-9,254) and retail trade (-3,909).

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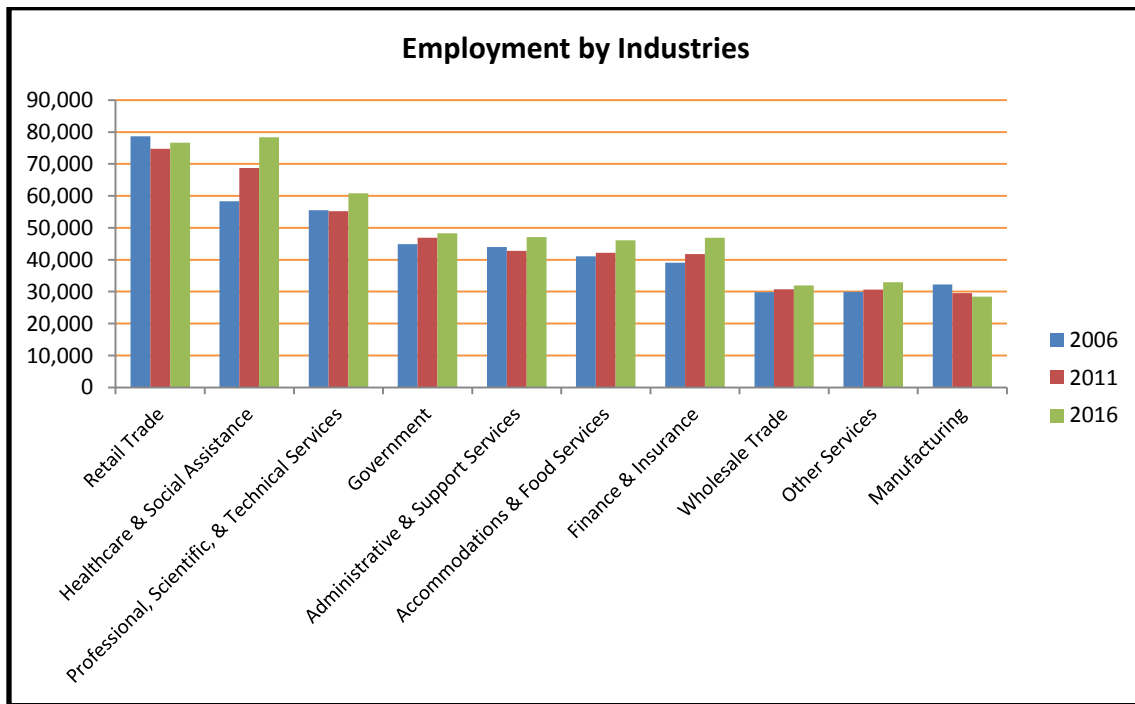


Looking Forward to 2016

- Over the next five years the 13th Congressional District is expected to gain 45,289 jobs, with jobs growing at a much higher rate than the State’s projected rate. The healthcare and social assistance industry sector is projected to add 9,568 jobs followed by the professional, scientific, and technical services industry sector with 5,531 additional jobs.
- Retail trade is currently the largest industry sector, with 74,711 jobs and average earnings per worker, with benefits, of \$33,878. The healthcare and social assistance sector, now the second largest sector, is expected to surpass retail trade and be the largest sector by 2016.
- In Congressional District 13, the average earnings per worker, including benefits, is \$57,089 which is higher than the State average of \$55,276.

Occupations

Between 2006 and 2011

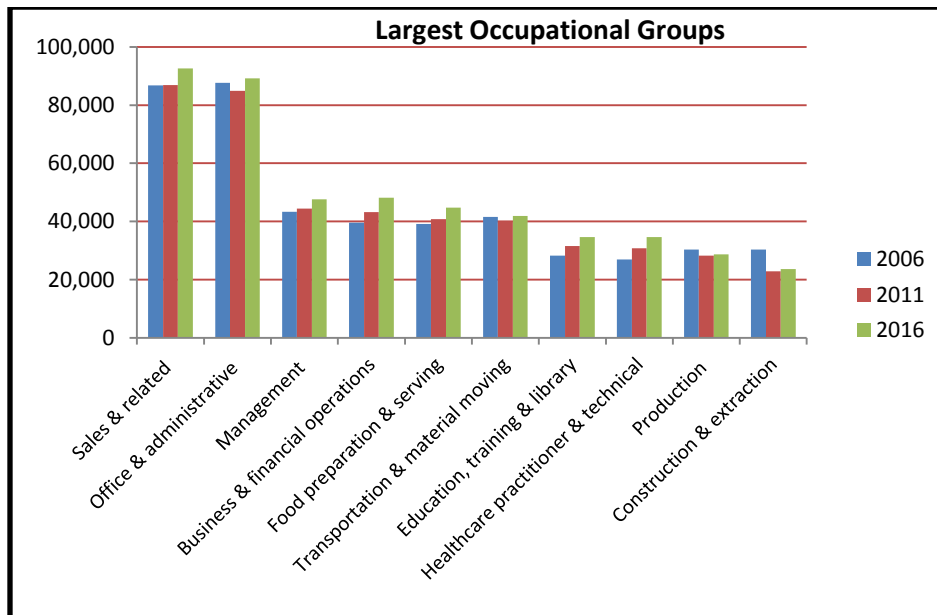
- Over the past 5 years, healthcare practitioner occupations grew the most adding 3,893 jobs in the Congressional District. The second largest growth was in business and financial operations occupations with 3,607 new jobs.
- Occupational groups with the highest rate of growth were healthcare support occupations (20%) and personal care and service occupations (13%).
- Construction and extraction occupations lost the most jobs (-7,426) followed by office and administrative support occupations (-2753).
- The largest occupational group in the Congressional District is sales and related occupations with 86,861 jobs followed by office and administrative support occupations with 84,864 jobs.

Looking Forward to 2016

- Over the next 5 years, sales and related occupations are expected to have the largest job growth, adding 5,707 jobs. Business and financial operations occupations are expected to have the second largest gain with 5,019 additional jobs.
- Legal occupations earn the highest average hourly wage of \$40.02 followed by management occupations averaging \$38.20 per hour.
- The highest proportional growth is projected for healthcare support occupations with a 16% increase, followed by personal care and services with a 14% increase.



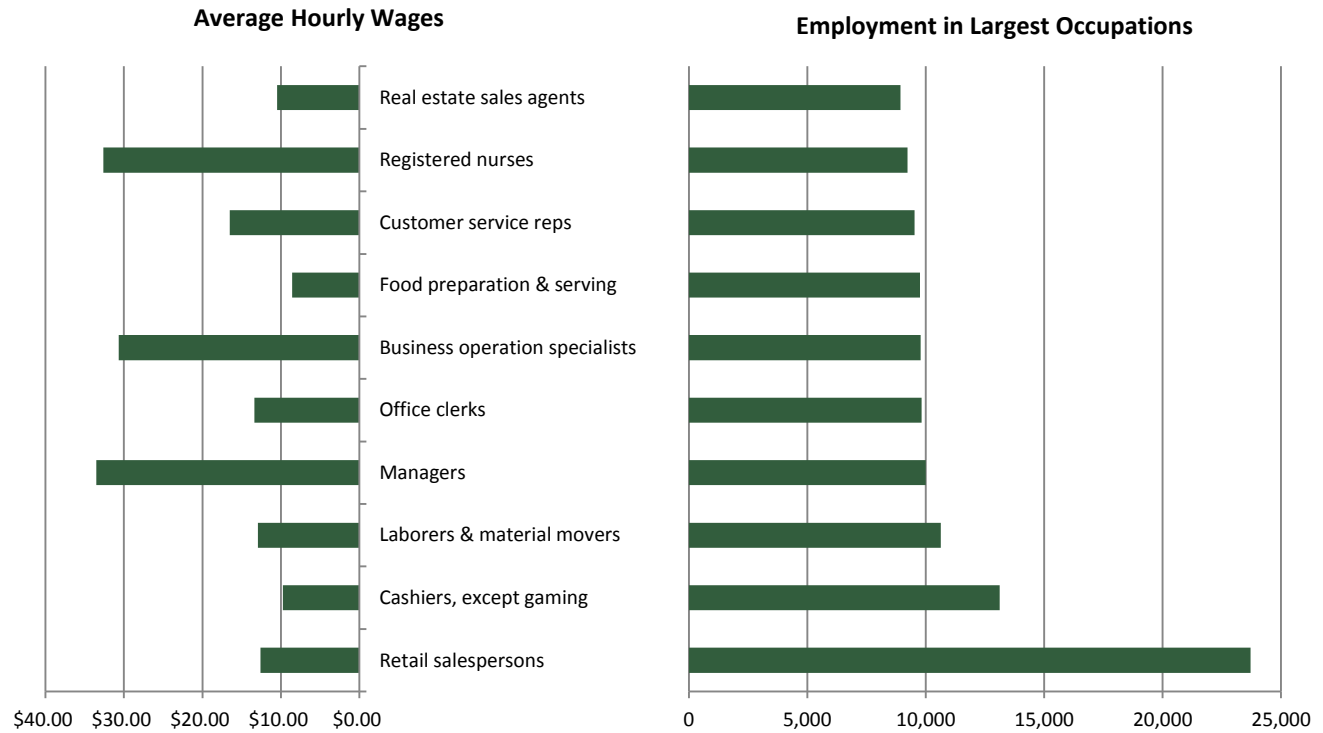
Occupations Poised for Growth in 2016

- Retail salespersons and cashiers are the two largest occupations in the Congressional District. However, there are several of the largest occupations that are high skilled and high wage jobs, such as manager, business operations specialists, customer service representatives, and registered nurses.

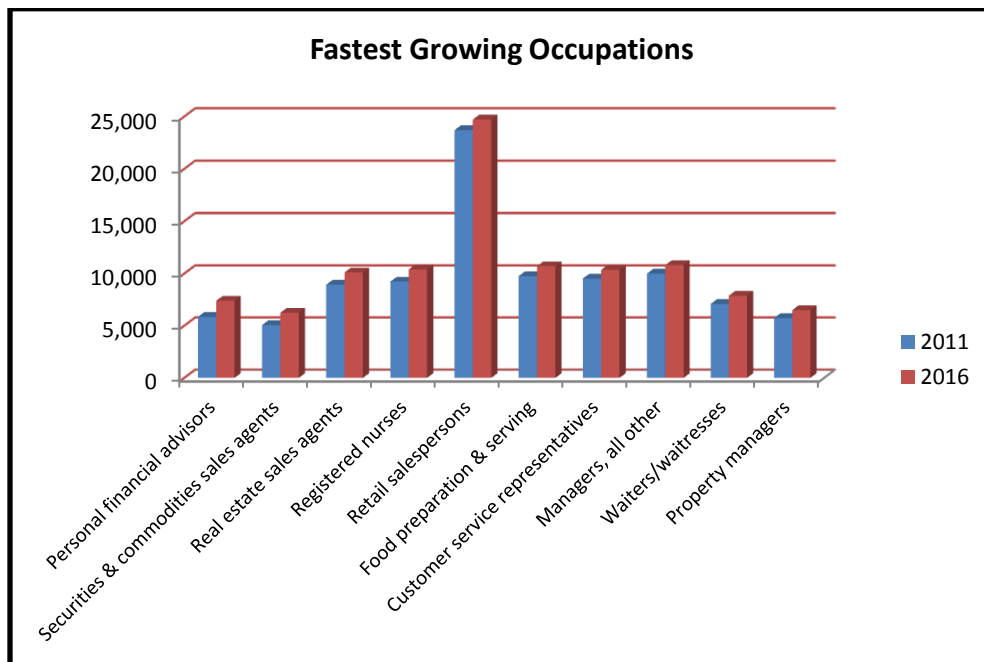

- In the top ten largest occupations, managers have the highest hourly earnings of \$33.53 per hour followed by registered nurses at \$32.64 per hour.



- Personal financial advisors and securities, commodities, and financial service sale agents are the fastest growing occupations in the Congressional District.



Occupations Requiring Educational Attainment

- In the 13th Congressional District, the largest occupation requiring a post secondary vocational award or higher is business operation specialists.
- Five of the top ten occupations requiring an educational attainment beyond high school completion are also among the fastest growing occupations: registered nurses; real estate sales agents; personal financial advisors, property, real estate, and community association managers; and securities, commodities, and financial service sales agents.
